NATA Ethnic Diversity Advisory Committee – Grant Wilson

Ethnic Diversity Enhancement Grant

Grants are available to those educational institutions seeking to enhance ethnic diversity within the profession. These grants may be awarded to educational institutions under one of the following categories:

- **Category 1.** Develop various programs intended to recruit, retain and educate ethnically diverse athletic training students with the intent to increase the number of ethnically diverse Certified Athletic Trainers.
- **Category 2.** Disseminate information relating to health care issues and conditions relevant to ethnically diverse populations (sickle cell disease, lactose intolerance, at-risk populations, Blount's Disease, hypertension, etc.).
- **Category 3.** Enhance the professional development and stature of ethnically diverse Certified Athletic Trainers to better serve the profession, ultimately leading to an increased representation of ethnically diverse leaders at both the district and national level.

- c. District representation is fulfilled within the 45-member Council

2) WHY?

- a. We represent many different "silo" settings
 - i. Greater representation for these "silo" settings
- b. Quicker response to seemingly benign healthcare changes that will alter how ATs in these settings will practice, but fly under the radar by other standards
- c. Continue pushing these professional settings forward by ensuring athletic training practice aligns with changes in the global healthcare scene
- d. Now have a group of "Subject Matter Experts", regardless of district, that are at the forefront of their setting

3) Council Logistics

- a. Adopt standard NATA Committee term limits
 - i. These term limits will be staggered for the first 3 years to avoid everyone rolling off at the same time
- b. Request will be made to BOD for current committee chairs that are supposed to be rolling off this June to be extended for a year for continuity purposes
- c. Council will finalize Policies and Procedures manual for COPA at NATA this June

d. Emphasis on "Subject Matter/Content Experts" versus formal district-based representation

- i. Despite this, efforts will be made to ensure ALL districts are ALWAYS represented within COPA
- e. State representatives will still be needed

- c. Begin moving forward as the Council
